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THE WRITE REVEREND



I recently heard a pastor share an incident in his experience where he found himself needing to apologize to a member for something he had done. He said he apologized for his behavior and then asked for the member's forgiveness. The member readily gave her forgiveness, but then quickly added: "But I don't forget!" Most of the people in the room at the time laughed with the preacher and by their laughter agreed with his inference that this was most certainly an example of un-forgiveness if there ever was one.

But I disagreed (silently as I laughed with the crowd)! I think we have gotten this thing of forgiveness all wrong. You see, memory is the key to human personality; we can only hold on to who we are and whose we are through the tremendous gift of memory.

As an example of this truth, we need only look at the loss of memory that accompanies diseases like dementia and Alzheimer's that make these mala-

dies so difficult for both those needing care and their caregivers alike.

Forgiveness and forgetfulness then are not the two sides of the coin of reconciliation. To be truly forgiving means first that we clearly remember the hurt; we remember the slight; we remember the injury; we remember the wrong, we remember the abuse, we remember the violence. In remembering, however, we also make a commitment to not let the hurt, the slight, the injury, the wrong, the abuse, the violence stand between us and the person who treated us poorly. We refuse to empower evil and wrong to decide how we will feel or how we will act or how we will live. Instead, we love and live like God loves, and in so doing, we deliver ourselves from being the victimized and we become victorious over this circumstance.

We don't try to be God and throw acts of injustice and unkindness into the lake of forgetfulness; we just simply refuse to give them power over us. It does not mean we choose to be abused or mistreated; we instead chose to live free of revenge or the need to retaliate on the one hand, or the need to cower in guilt or unresolved conflict on the other.

This is real love. This is agape love; what William Barclay calls *unconquerable benevolence*. He says: $Agap\bar{e}$ does not mean a feeling of the heart, which we cannot help, and which comes unbidden and unsought; it means a determination of the mind, whereby we achieve this unconquerable goodwill even to those who hurt and injure us. $Agap\bar{e}$, someone has said, is the power to love those whom we do not like and who may not like us. In point of fact, we can only have $agap\bar{e}$ when Jesus Christ enables us to conquer our natural tendency to anger and bitterness, and to achieve this invincible goodwill to all people.
