THE MIRACLE OF FLIGHT TAKES ON NEW MEANING

Imagine an area about the size of Texas, 270,000 sq. miles, with a population of around 6 million (compared to 25 million in Texas), that has been ravaged by war, is so remote there are no roads, and has no doctors or medical care available to the inhabitants within hundreds and hundreds of miles.

The United Methodist Committee on Relief found just such a place and is lending a hand.

For the last 50 years, UM planes have been flying in Africa, saving lives and spreading the gospel. Currently, the program, UM Aviation Ministries, supports 3 pilots serving 3 remote UM Conferences in the Democratic Republic of Congo: North Katanga, Central Congo and Southern Congo. There are no air traffic controllers and no radar or weather reporting stations, so each time the pilots take flight, they put their lives in God's hands.

Gaston Ntambo, a UM missionary and pilot, has flown accident-free for 14 years. He says the dangers and hardships through which he travels are all worth that one moment when he knows he got someone to a doctor in time.
