**Pastor's Ponderings** 

Oscar Romero, martyr of the church in El Salvador, said, "A church that suffers no persecution but enjoys the privileges and support of the things

of the earth — beware! — is not the true church of Jesus Christ. A preaching that does not point out sin is not the preaching of the gospel. A preaching that makes sinners feel good, so that they are secured in their sinful state, betrays the gospel's call." — Common Prayer: A Liturgy for Ordinary Radicals Well, those are pretty strong words!

We live in a time when many feel that the church is suffering persecution – even in the United States. But are we really? Not when we compare ourselves to the situations of Christians in the Middle East, the Far East, Africa, Asia, Latin America, and other places throughout the world – even as near to us as Mexico. And certainly not when we compare our situation with the hundreds of thousands of refugees who are fleeing from their homelands and entering the European Union to escape religious conversion or death. Comparatively speaking, you might say that we in these United States are still enjoying the "privileges and support of the things of the earth."

We may be confusing persecution with losing ground. We don't carry the clout we once did. We don't have the power and authority to influence others that we once did. We share the nation with people who hold beliefs other than Christian. Surely our faith can withstand the changing landscape in which there is more religious diversity than before – and even when there is a growing disdain for any religion at all among some. But are we being persecuted?

The more pertinent question is why are we losing ground? Why is it that the church isn't held in the high regard it once was? Why is the church not as relevant as it once was? Could it be that our privileged position is what is really costing us our faith?

Sometimes we need to face the truth of the matter – and especially in church. We need to face the truth about ourselves. And the truth of the matter is that we still have it pretty good in this country. It's not so much those who are overtly against the church who are creating problems and diminishing the power of the church as it is those of us within the church who are comfortable with the way things have always been and the privileged position we have enjoyed. We like our comfort. While people around us suffer – still we like our comfort. Beware! Lest we betray the gospel's call.

In the words of John Wesley, "I am not afraid that the people called Methodists should ever cease to exist either in Europe or America. But I am afraid, lest they should only exist as a dead sect, having the form of religion without the power."
